FROM THE ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL – SECONDARY Wudinna Area School Track & Field Carnival

We look forward to a great day of participation and competition at Track & Field Carnival tomorrow. It provides the House Captains with excellent opportunities to showcase their leadership skills and for all students to participate and have a go at all the different athletic events. It will be great to see students cheering for their house and other participants in a show of good sportsmanship. As it is going to be quite a warm day, a reminder to all students – please wear your hats when not competing and apply sunscreen to protect your skin from burning.

Reading training

Many Secondary staff joined with the Primary teachers to attend Guided Reading training last week. It is vital for all students to be confident and competent readers to interpret assessment tasks and be able to make best use of information within their written and spoken responses. This training was an excellent add-on to the online training completed last year with Sheena Cameron and Louise Dempsey.

Homework expectations

This is expected for all school subjects. Some subjects are quite demanding and often students will need to spend longer than the allocated time in order to consolidate understanding.

The School Policy is:

- Year 8 to 10 – three subjects per night (set on the days on which students have a double lessons for their subjects)
 - Year 8 – 20 minutes per subject
 - Year 9 – 25 minutes per subject
 - Year 10 – 30 minutes per subject
- Stage 1 - 3 subjects per night 40 minutes each (2 hours)
- Stage 2 – 2½ hours per subject per week (minimum); students are encouraged to spend up to 50% of their vacation time during the year on course work or revision activities in order to complete all summative learning activities and to prepare for examinations/ external assessment requirements.

Student understanding of skills and concepts is enhanced with the review of learning outside of school hours that consolidate the activities undertaken during the day.

Parental support is sought in checking with your child/ren on what homework they have to do and whether or not this has been completed.

Staff also have an expectation that they will set relevant and engaging homework for students that will extend and confirm the learning completed during their school lesson times.

Brightpath Literacy Assessment

For Year 8 and 9 students, we will again be involved in assessing student writing using the *Brightpath* ruler of benchmarked student writing. This will be an improvement year based on our work in 2019 and 2020. Other subjects will also be involved in the benchmarking of writing using the Information Report Writing ruler – Wudinna is involved in a trial of this assessment tool and it will be great for all teachers to be involved in the assessment of an even wider range of student writing. The first writing assessment (Narrative) will be uploaded and

assessed prior to the end of term. Persuasive and Report writing will be assessed in Term 2.

Reading and Writing focus

Reading and Writing will continue to be our focus areas for improvement in 2021 as outlined in our Site Improvement Plan. Primary staff have been busy attending Literacy workshops this term including a Spell-it workshop for the Middle and Upper Primary staff. Spell-It is a continuation of InitialLit and is a whole class instruction for students in Years 4-7. The staff members who attended this workshop are looking forward to using this program in their classrooms.

Last Tuesday Primary and Secondary staff participated in an online training in Guided Reading. Next Wednesday, 17 March, a member of the Brightpath Writing Assessment team will be visiting our school to run writing workshops for our teachers throughout the day and a Masterclass after school. This year the Primary teachers will be assessing and uploading their students’ narrative and persuasive writing in Terms 1 and 3 and Information reports in Term 2 and 4. Teachers will use the data from the writing assessments to identify the areas for explicit teaching to move students along in their writing.

Good luck to all competitors in the Track and Field Carnival tomorrow.

At the Ag block we have the Speckle Park cattle, chooks, ducks and now our team of wethers for the SA School Merino Wether Competition at the Adelaide Show in September. Well done to the Ag students for their selection of the sheep on Monday Week 5, which we will care for until the show to create our team. We would like to thank the community members for firstly providing the sheep as well as for their time and expertise in providing the learning opportunity.

The Year 9 class have been tending to the vegetable plot that they prepared at the end of last year and harvesting some delicious summer fruit and vegetables. In the past couple of weeks they also had a run-down on sheep selection traits to help them to select the wethers. They did a great job putting that theory into practice, as did the Year 10's who studied it last year. The Year 10 class have got right into learning about soils and will soon apply this to production in the local region. In the Year 11/12 Ag lessons we have been looking at how new Technologies are advancing Agriculture at such a rapid rate, and predicting what Ag could look like in the future.

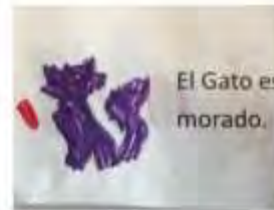

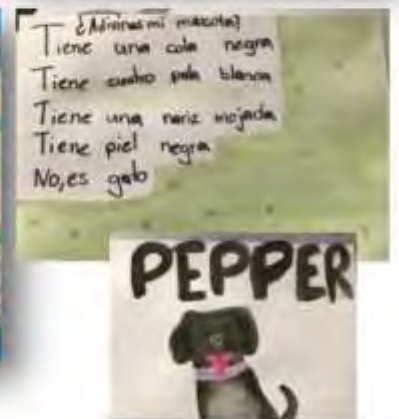

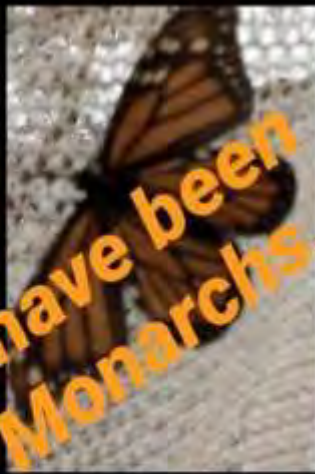
