## **Premiers Reading Challenge**

All students are expected to undertake the Premiers Reading Challenge unless they have completed all the levels of the challenge. We want all students to have lots of reading experience from levelled readers, magazines, novels and comics. Many different books are included in the challenge, please talk to Grant in the library if you are unsure.

### Reading Fluency/Comprehension

The process of reading is very complex and can be very difficult to master. We have lots of students with good reading fluency i.e. they know their words. Our data demonstrates that our students are struggling with making meaning (comprehension) from the text read. Listed below are a few ideas for listening to reading at home.

## **Reading Fluency vs Reading Comprehension** Melissa Mullin, Ph.D.

The goal of reading is to gain information, whether it is what happens to the characters in a story, or learning about the world. Reading fluency is the speed and accuracy of decoding words. Reading comprehension is the ability to understand what you are reading. When reading fluency skills are higher than reading comprehension skills:

- Make sure the student slows down and processes what the words are saying.
  - Before beginning a book take time to discuss the cover and title with the student:
    - Why do you think they chose this title?
    - What do you think the book is going to be about?
- Stop and ask comprehension questions as you read:
  - What do you think the main character looks like?
  - What do you think the setting looks like?
  - o What do you think will happen next?
  - o Why do you think that character did that?
  - o Is what just happened in the book something you have ever experienced?

Fluid reading with good comprehension is the goal for all readers. Some students learn one aspect of reading more easily than the others. Take the time to build both fluency and comprehension so your child becomes a proficient reader.
